MEDITATION ON STILLE NACHT

Handbell Solo with Piano

PERFORMANCE NOTES:

Meditation on Stille Nacht was arranged one snowy morning several years ago while our family was snowbound. While the snow lightly floated to the ground, my intent was to capture the wonder, the awe, and the majesty of that first Christmas night.

For the Pianist:

As with the Soloist, rubato, rubato, rubato! Be prepared to stretch and release tempos with the soloist. Play with much expressionn, allowing the piano to sing in subtle ways. This will keep the bells at the forefront. Bring out any melody snippets (e.g. mm. 10, 14, 54-57). Build to a big climax in m. 42. From that point on, allow the music to gently unwind.



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


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For the Soloist:

Rubato is the word on this arrangement. Make it yours! Be expressive. Dynamic markings have been kept at a minimum. Do not hesitate to expand on what's already in the score. Feel free to stretch tempos as needed, especially during the ascending and descending eighth note scale patterns. For the octave leaps, it will be helpful to reset the lower Cs (C6 in m. 26, C5 in m. 31) to facilitate the quick move. Ample time is given to replace the C6. (The C5 does not play any more in this setting.)
